Relating and Resourcing

We are quite often asked what the Anabaptist Network is. Sometimes there is a hint of suspicion in the question. Is this a new denomination or institution? Will it compete for the time and energy of Christians or diminish their commitment to their own churches?

Usually I respond by emphasising the two main purposes of the Network:

- *Linking together* Christians from many backgrounds who find inspiration in the Anabaptist tradition, but whose friends and other church members do not share this enthusiasm.
- *Providing resources* to enable people to draw on the Anabaptist tradition – its rich and diverse history, its distinctive values and its contemporary significance.

A recent email is typical of what we are about. **Pete Jones** writes: 'I'm just writing a quick note to ask whether there are any AN members/affiliates in the Merseyside/Wirral area. I know there isn't a study group, but I was wondering if anyone wanted just to meet up and chat – not necessarily create a study group, just some fellowship with likeminded Anabaptists. I don't mind my name and email being published in the AN newsletter in case there's anyone in need of contact.' (If you want to respond, contact Pete at jonesylar@yahoo.com).

Relating and resourcing are certainly core purposes of the Network. We have no ambition to become a large institution or create a new denomination. We are interested in equipping followers of Jesus to be faithful disciples and to engage creatively with contemporary culture. We believe that insights from Anabaptism are particularly helpful in our post-Christendom context, but we also value the contributions of other traditions and expect most people in the Network will find ways of integrating into their own churches what they learn from Anabaptism.

The conferences we organise often explore resonances between Anabaptism and other traditions. The resources on our website are intended for use in many different settings. Increasingly we are being invited to offer Anabaptist insights in conversations and conferences on various topics. And we want to provide support and resources for our partner organisations in the **Root and Branch** network, whose Anabaptist convictions are being outworked in peacemaking, urban church planting, mediation, campaigning for justice and other ways.

What we are beginning to find, though, is that people from beyond the churches are encountering Christian faith via Anabaptism. The article this month, written by **Graham Paley**, is a fascinating and encouraging example of this. And some people are creating new churches with explicitly Anabaptist values at their core. In an emerging post-Christendom culture, neither development is surprising. So relating and resourcing will continue to be our dual vocation, but we will need to expand what we offer and to engage with a wider audience. We would welcome any suggestions you may have to enable us to respond to this challenge.

Conferences 2006

During the past month we have been planning our conference schedule for 2006. There are 4 events planned in different parts of the country. Further details of these conferences will appear on our website and in the next newsletter, once these are finalised, but we can announce now the following events:

On Saturday **14 January** the East Midlands Baptist Association has invited the Network, in partnership with Urban Expression, to present a day, *Creating Church on the Margins*, in Melton Mowbray, exploring the Anabaptist tradition and the challenge of mission from the margins.

On Saturday **25 March** the Anabaptist Network study group in Lockerbie is organising an event in Annan – our first Network event in Scotland. The subject will be *Practical Anabaptism*.

On Saturday **1 July** in Birmingham the Network will host a book launch for the next book in our 'After Christendom' series, *Faith and Politics after Christendom*, and a day conference on the same theme. Speakers will include Jonathan Bartley, Andrew Bradstock and Alan Storkey.

On Saturday **4 November** Cliff College (Calver, in Derbyshire) will host and co-sponsor a day event exploring the Anabaptist and Methodist traditions. In particular, we will be investigating Christian initiation and discipleship.

News

Lakeland gathering: members of the Network in northwest England and southwest Scotland gathered in July at the historic Baptist chapel in Hawkshead Hill, Cumbria. Dating from the 17th century and with an outside baptistery, this was a great venue for the first Anabaptist meeting in this part of the country since the Network began in 1991. Further meetings are planned here on 21 January and 20 May 2006

Theology forum: the next event is scheduled for 15-16 December 2005. The main subject will be 'Christian Perfection'. Speakers include Phil Meadows, Chris Rowland and Stuart Murray Williams. If you are interested in being involved in this or future events, please contact us for an invitation.

Crucible: this course, jointly sponsored by our Root and Branch partners Urban Expression and Workshop (and Alove), explores church planting, urban mission and emerging church. 30+ people registered for the first weekend (29-30 October). We have added quite a lot of new material to the website since the last newsletter:

We are continuing to talk with other possible authors about contributions beyond the fourth and fifth books planned: *Worship and Mission after Christendom* (2007) and *Reading the Bible after Christendom* (2008).

Advanced Workshop

The first year of the two-year course came to an end in July and students have now embarked on their second year. A few have dropped out, realising the demands on time are too much for them in their present circumstances. However, 11 students continue to study for the Licence in Theology and two more are doing the course but not studying for the LTh.

If you have completed Workshop, have a first degree in another subject and would like to pursue further study in Ethics, Hermeneutics and Apologetics with a significant Anabaptist element then AW is for you! The next course commences in October 2006 and the intention is to hold it in Birmingham once a suitable venue has been found. The course involves attendance for one whole weekend every two months over two years and the completion of twelve essays over that period.

The following are examples of debates started in AW lectures and continued on the website:

- The relevance of systematic theology to the ongoing life of the church
- Orthodoxy v orthopraxy
- The myth of Pauline communities
- The notion of omnigender rather than the dominant binary gender construct
